Study Skills for the Week in 4th & 5th Grades - Scanning

Scanning is commonly combined with skimming, but they actually serve different purposes. Skimming is reading key words to get an overall idea of a passage. Scanning is looking over a passage to try to find a key word or phrase. In scanning, you don't really read, you just look for a specific item. In class, we will practice "taking a picture" in our mind of a word or phrase that we are looking for. Then, we will scan a text to find it. This can be a great tool for hunting down answers to comprehension questions. Next time your student has questions to answer at the end of a Social Studies chapter, have him/her highlight a key word or phrase in the question, then scan the text for that word or phrase!

Next Parenting Rountable, Tuesday, December 3 at 12:00 p.m.

We are so excited to welcome Katie Bushmiaer on Tuesday, December 3 at 12:00 p.m. as our special guest speaker for the next Parenting Roundtable! Mrs. Bushmiaer is the owner of *Little Rock Paper Scissors*, a local professional organization company. She will be here to give us lots of great tips and tricks on ways to better organize our homes and make the most use of our spaces! Mrs. Bushmiaer will share new ideas on how to manage the ever growing amount of kids belongings, school materials, and keepsakes. We look forward to seeing you all on Dec. 3 in the Lower School Conference Room or Library.

Missed the last Parenting Roundtable? Find notes from the past meeting with Ashley O'Roark below:

We were so grateful to have Mrs. O'Roark speak at our November Parent Roundtable. Mrs. O'Roark was filled with information on nutrition, helpful tips on healthier choices for snacks and meals, and how different vitamins and minerals impact our health. Here are some notes from her visit:

- Children should have no more than approximately 25 grams of sugar a day. Breakfast should include 9 grams or less.
- Finding ways to include protein in the diet is important, especially at breakfast. Greek yogurt, peanut butter, and some waffle mixes can be good sources of protein. Smoothies can be another way to get a healthy, protein packed breakfast, but be careful if using protein powder that it does not have high sugar.
- She shared the "apple trick" she uses with her own kids that tests how hungry they really are for a snack. If you have already given them a snack after school and they complain they're still hungry, offer them a piece of fruit as their only option for more.
- Magnesium can help with emotional regulation, attention, migraines, and muscle cramps. It can be a great to supplement into diet.
- Low Omega 3's has been linked to some mental health issues. Walnuts and wild caught salmon are good sources of Omega 3's.
- Want to look for supplements that are USP approved (means they are also FDA approved).
- The importance of gut health is being emphasized today. Taking a prebiotic and probiotic can help with gut health. Consider especially if your child has been on frequent antibiotics.
- It is now known that Eating Disorders are 60-80% genetic. They are often times triggered by life circumstances and lack of coping skills. Developing a healthy way of understanding food and nutrition is important to begin at an early age. Not emphasizing weight but healthy choices is key (consider how often you weight yourself in front of your child).
- Being careful of the language you use at home to make sure you are not unknowingly encouraging unhealthy self talk- try not to use phrases like "I feel so fat".

Mrs. O'Roark was filled with so much useful information that we hope to have her back some time to continue the discussion. As we know in this day and age, what we put in our bodies has a tremendous impact on our overall health and well being. It's important for us to continue to develop insights on what can help our families make healthy choices.

A Note from Dr. McCormick

Dear Parents,

I find it incomprehensible that we are on the cusp of Thanksgiving Break and the winter holiday season! On behalf of our faculty, I would like to wish you and your families a healthy and safe Thanksgiving holiday. At Thursday morning's meeting, I encouraged our students to be kind and safe when using technology and/or social media over the break, and relative to this, advisory groups participated on Thursday in our second, gamified social media lesson provided by the Social Institute. Mrs. Agee, coordinator of this curriculum, was kind enough to provide this update:

Middle School students learned how to "protect their privacy like they're famous" by playing the #Winatsocial Game created by the The Social Institute. During advisory, the 6th grade students discussed the importance of strong passwords and keeping their information secure. Students were given scenarios where individuals were asked to give personal information online. Students discussed actions to take to keep their information safe. When we return from Thanksgiving break 6th grade students will practice making strong passwords with an online resource, https://howsecureismypassword.net. 7th grade students focused on photographs and videos online and how to protect the privacy of yourself and others. Students were given scenarios where individuals had embarrassing photos or videos taken on someone else's device. Students discussed why posting a photo or video of someone without their permission could be hurtful. When we return from Thanksgiving break 7th grade students will complete a scavenger hunt to determine why personal data is priceless. 8th grade students discussed how companies use your information and track online actions to create personally targeted ads. Students discussed the pros and cons of data collection and how to "opt out" of companies collecting personal info. When we return from Thanksgiving break 8th grade students will complete a survey to determine where they fall on the privacy spectrum and determine if they need to make changes to their privacy settings.
