## Co-Curricular News - Art

## PreK and Kindergarten

Pre-K3, Pre-K4, and Kindergarten Wildcats have grown so much already this year. As they are exposed to new materials and concepts, students are soaking it all in and approaching each project with great enthusiasm!

Pre-K3 students have been very busy! They learned about the element of line and practiced making different types of lines using a paintbrush, crayons, and various household items (toy cars, potato mashers, forks, etc.). Students in Pre-K3 also learned about shapes and how we can use shapes to create art. After learning about artist Wayne Thiebaud, they created a gumball
machine using shapes. Students also learned about artist Pablo Picasso and used cutout paper shapes to create "Preschool Picassos". Finally, in celebration of Halloween, Pre-K3 students used shapes to paint ghosts. Pre-K3 has begun their unit on colors and have been introduced to primary and secondary colors. They participated in an experiment and then used the primary colors to create the secondary colors. They had so much fun! In the coming weeks, Pre-K3 will continue to use lines and shapes as they explore the element of color.

Pre-K4 students are having a wonderful time in Art! They learned about the element of line and how to make several different types of lines, such as straight, zig zag, wavy and broken. Students used pencils, yarn and tempera paint, oil pastels, and watercolors to create lines. In addition to learning about the element of line, Pre-K4 learned about the element of shape. After learning about artist Paul Klee, students used shape cut outs to create their own version of "Castle and Sun". Their next project was a "Silly Shape Monster." Students used markers to create the face for a monster and then cut out different shapes to complete it. Every monster was wonderful and unique and the students were able to practice using scissors and glue while having fun! Most recently, students were introduced to primary and secondary colors. They learned about the colors and how to create them and then practiced creating secondary colors using primary colors. Pre-K4 is learning so much and they are having so much fun in Art. In the coming weeks they will continue to use the elements of art they have learned about, as they continue to learn about new artists and elements of art.

Kindergarten students have been very busy learning and creating! After learning about different types of lines, students used India Ink to create lines. They filled their paper with lines and then used tempera cakes to fill in the area between the lines. The results were beautiful! Kindergarten students also used oil pastels and tempera paint to create colorful flowers using lines. Each flower was unique and had a lot of personality. The next element of art the students learned about was shape. After reviewing shapes and looking at the way simple shapes can be used to create more elaborate drawings, we looked at images of Laurel Burch's artwork. Students then followed a directed drawing activity using shapes to create their own "Shape Cat". After they drew their cat with a black oil pastel, Kindergarteners used watercolors to paint the cat and the background. A favorite project of the Kindergarten students was the "Silly Spiders on a Web." Students used shapes, lines, and patterns to create some wonderful artwork. This project also allowed students some time to practice using scissors and glue. Most recently, Kindergarten students have been introduced to the element of color. We discussed primary and secondary colors and practiced color mixing to create the secondary colors. In the coming weeks, Kindergarten students will continue to use what they have learned, as they are introduced to new concepts and artists.

All of the students continue to learn and grow as we work with different art materials. It is a joy to watch their enthusiasm and excitement as they practice, learn, and create. We have so many fun projects to work on this Fall and Winter as we continue to learn about master artists and the elements of art.

## $\mathbf{1 s t}_{\mathrm{st}} \mathbf{5}_{\mathrm{th}}$ Grade Art

What a great first quarter we have had in the upstairs art studio! We have explored many mediums and techniques to create fun artwork. It's hard to believe that we will be working on Holiday projects soon! If you would like to see what your student is working on, most students' artwork is uploaded to our school Artsonia account. If you need information on how to access Artsonia or need help finding your student's artwork, please let Ms.McSpadden know, I would be happy to help! Please keep reading to find out the fun we have been up to in the upstairs art studio.

First graders have been exploring the Elements of Art and how they help artists make artwork. To study the element of line, students were read "Library Lion" and walked through a guided drawing of a lion. Then, they decided what lines they wanted to use to create the lion's mane. We also talked about warm colors and used those to paint our lions. Then, we moved on from lines and are studying the ways we can make shapes with lines. Students were read "Clink!", then they used a variety of shapes to create their robots. In the coming months, we will return to our Caldecott series for a couple more projects.

Second graders have just finished a unit on Asia and to tie into that unit, we created warm and cool color dragons. We talked about symmetry when drawing the face of a dragon and I demonstrated how to create a perfectly symmetrical design. Be sure to check these out in the hallway, they are so fun! We are now finishing up fall landscapes. For this project, we learned how artists create the illusion of depth on a flat surface by using perspective. Students then learned how to draw a blanket on the ground using this technique. Next, we will be studying the jungles of the artist Henri Rousseau and learning how to draw jungle animals.

In our trip around the art world with third graders, we are finishing up our time in Mexico. First, we learned about the guitar makers of Paracho, Mexico before making our own paper guitars using warm and cool color schemes. We stayed in Mexico to learn about the artist Frida Kahlo and her portraits that featured her favorite pets. Students learned how to draw a $3 / 4$ pose portrait and added either their favorite animal or a pet to the picture, just like Frida! Next, we will be moving on to Austria to learn about the architect and artist Friedensreich Hundertwasser.

Fourth graders learned how they could use games to determine what they would draw and what media they would use for their artwork. First, we played a "Media \& Techniques Bingo" which determined the variety of media they would use in their artwork. Then, we played "Roll-aLandscape" which determined what elements they would use in their landscape. Each piece is truly unique depending on the combination of materials and elements in their landscape. It's a fun way to try new supplies and help work out the composition of their artwork. After we finished those landscapes, we learned how using one-point perspective can give our landscapes the illusion of depth while learning about analogous color schemes. Next, we will learn about two different artists and create a piece of art that will mash the two styles together.

After fifth grade finished their Hispanic Heritage Hall of Fame portraits, we continued the Hispanic Heritage Month celebrations by designing Dia de Los Muertos Sugar Skulls. We are just finishing up a project that reviewed what we learned last year about one-point perspective, but we added a twist. They used the one-point perspective technique to design a cityscape that
looks like it is popping off the surface of a planet and into space. Next, we will explore the artist Claus Oldenberg and create soft sculptures in his style.

## Little Rockers Begins Monday

The Little Rockers Program will begin on Monday, November 4. This program, run in conjunction with the Little Rock Marathon, teaches students the importance of teamwork and physical fitness while emphasizing self-confidence and perseverance. The program runs on Monday afternoons and is open to second through fifth-grade students. Students run 25.2 miles over several months with the final mile being run during Marathon Weekend as part of the Little Rock Marathon.
