Parents can come at any time, but we would like to recommend again this year that your child receive their vaccine with their classmates. Please note that if your child displays anxiety or refuses to take the vaccine, we will notify you by the number listed on the back of the Flu Consent Form. If you would like to come with your child, please try and come during their schedule grade pull-out time. The schedule will be printed in the Wildcat Weekly the week before the clinic.

Co-Curricular News - Music

Pre-K3

Students in Pre-K3 have been learning to use different parts of their voices by imitating glissandos played on a slide whistle. We have also been working on using different variations of our voices such as our "whisper, speaking, talking, and outside" voices. Two simple songs the children have been working on in class are *Frog in the Meadow* and *Pitter Patter*.

Pre-K4

In Pre-K4 we have been exploring classical music by moving to short excerpts from *Faust* and *Gaîté Parisienne*. The students did very well at coming up with silly animal lyrics to add to *Down By the Bay*, filling in the phrase "Did you ever see a whale with a polka dot tail?" We have also been hard at work learning the song *Fais Dodo* in Cajun French.

Appropriate Safety Tips for Today

Episcopal Collegiate Lower School Parent Round Table

Is "Stranger Danger" still appropriate for this day and age?

- Short answer is no. Stranger danger is not completely ineffective but doesn't teach children the skills that are most useful to keep themselves safe today.
- 90% of incidents (abuse or abduction) that occur involve someone the child knows.

Teaching the difference between a good stranger and a bad stranger (or "tricky people")

Good Stranger Characteristics:

• Someone you can ask for help- police officers, firemen, store clerks with name tags, parents with children, security guards, teachers, etc...

Bad Stranger Characteristics:

- Someone who tries to get a child to do something without their parents' permission. Some examples include
 - o An adult asks them to disobey their parents or do something without permission.
 - o An adult that asks them to keep a secret.
 - An adult that asks children for help- adults should ask other adults for help.

New language to use instead of stranger danger: (National Center for Missing and Exploited Children)

- Don't say: Never talk to strangers
- Say: You should not approach just anyone. If you need help, look for the "good" or "safe" strangers.
- Don't say: Stay away from people you don't know.
- Say: It's important you get permission before going anywhere with anyone.
- Don't say: You can tell someone is bad just by looking at them.
- Say: Pay attention to what people do. Tell me right away if anyone asks you to keep a secret, makes you feel uncomfortable, or tries to get you to go with them.
- Begin teaching them how to trust their intuition. You can begin to discuss that "uh oh" feeling you get when you feel like something is wrong.

Simple safety rules to begin teaching: (www.asecurelife.com)

- Trust yourself- if something doesn't feel right, get help right away.
- Always walk with a buddy.
- Memorize your name, parents' names, address, and phone number.
- Secrets aren't safe.
- Play the freeze game if lost.
- Yell and tell if someone tries to force you to go with them, yell as loud as you can statements like "this person is not my dad", "help", "I don't know you"
- Use a family code word- in case a neighbor, relative, friend they are unfamiliar with has to pick them up, have them ask for the code word so they know they are safe to go with.
- Find a good stranger.

Online safety tips:

- Never give your personal information to a person online.
- Use parental controls.
- Do not use open chat rooms on video games.
- Trust your conscious, if it feels wrong, it probably is wrong.
- An appropriate adult will never need your help, ask a child for their personal info, need a picture from you, want to be a "friend" with you...
- If they are looking for attention online, there may be a bigger issue with friendship/relationship building in person, self-esteem, anxiety, etc...

Find ways in your everyday life to practice and instill these strategies in your children. For example:

- When in public, point out "good" strangers so they become more aware of what that means.
- Have kids practice talking to strangers in your presence.

• Role play - practice with a parked car what they need to do if someone asks them to get in, practice acting out how to respond if a stranger asks them for help, or if someone they know makes them feel uncomfortable.

- Ages 6-9- Do You Have a Secret?

- How do you teach safety skills in your home?

- What are your biggest fears about your child's safety?
- Any good tips or books you've found helpful on this topic?

Study Skills for 4th & 5th Grades - Long Term Assignments

Next Wednesday marks the end of our first quarter of classes, with family conference day on Thursday. We have asked teachers to submit final grades for the first quarter to Ms. Fitz in time for her to publish report cards on the afternoon of Wednesday, October 16. To view your child's report card after they are published, sign into Veracross and select "Classes and Reports" next to your child's name. On the screen that follows, click on the link for the quarter one under the report card heading. Note that this text will be visible (but inactive) before grades are complete, and that the link will become active when grades are complete and report cards are posted.

As we look forward to our Fall Break next weekend, I hope that the long weekend will serve as a time of rest for you and your family. The break comes at the end of a very successful first quarter, and I realize that some of us might be tempted to use these days as an opportunity either to catch up on work that may have been set aside or to get ahead with preparations for the second quarter. Recognizing the importance of time away from school for rest and reflection, I hope that as much as possible, you'll use this time to disconnect, to relax, and to engage with family and friends, and that the break helps you enter the second quarter feeling rested, energized, and excited about what the rest of this year promises to hold.

Please remember that after we return from Fall Break, the Upper School will not hold regular classes on Wednesday, October 16. Our tenth and eleventh graders will be taking the PSAT that morning, our ninth graders will be participating in a service learning project at the Arkansas State Capitol and Supreme Court, and our seniors have the day free so that they can work on college applications and essays. All of our Upper School students should visit our annual Flu Clinic that day: ninth grade students at the conclusion of their service learning project, tenth and eleventh grade students at the conclusion of the PSAT, and seniors between 11:30 and 3:00.

AP Psychology Brain Imaging

On Thursday, September 26, the AP Psychology class took a field trip to the Brain Imaging Lab at UAMS to see the most recent projects using functional magnetic resonance imaging (fMRI). After hearing about the projects currently underway, students got to try out the equipment firsthand. Hayden Smith had a 3-D model of his skull taken to allow him a secure fit in the fMRI machine just as fidgety young children would require. Lucie Hughes demonstrated the importance of the test scanner that the researchers use to first practice with new patients. Finally, Alyssa Baker underwent a full brain scan and performed basic motor functions in the fMRI machine to show the active areas (particularly the motor cortex and occipital lobe) involved in finger tapping and vision. The students left with a new found appreciation for the detailed work of these researchers and the tremendous potential that neuroscience now allows for diagnosis and treatment of mental health disorders. Thank you, Alyssa Baker, who has allowed these photos of her brain scan to be shared. How cool!
